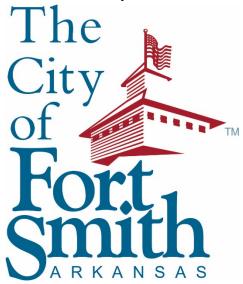
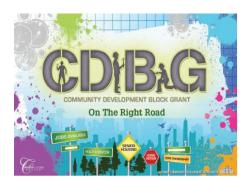

#### **Executive Summary**

#### AP-05 Executive Summary - 24 CFR 91.200(c), 91.220(b)

#### 1. Introduction

In 1994, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) issued new rules consolidating the planning, application, reporting and citizen participation processes for four formula grant programs: Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), Home Investment Partnerships (HOME), Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG) and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA). The new single-planning process was intended to more comprehensively fulfill three basic goals: to provide decent housing, to provide a suitable living environment and to expand economic opportunities. It was termed the Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development.

According to HUD, the Consolidated Plan is designed to be a collaborative process whereby a community establishes a unified vision for housing and community development actions. It offers entitlements the opportunity to shape these housing and community development programs into effective, coordinated neighborhood and community development strategies. It also allows for strategic planning and citizen participation to occur in a comprehensive context, thereby reducing duplication of effort.

As the lead agency for the Consolidated and Annual Action Plan, the Community Development Department (CDD) hereby follows HUD's guidelines for citizen and community involvement. Furthermore, it is responsible for overseeing these citizen participation requirements, those that accompany the Consolidated Plan and the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME).

#### **Purpose of the Annual Action Plan**

The 2020 Fort Smith Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development is the one-year planning document identifying the needs and respective resource investments in addressing the city's housing, homeless, non-homeless special needs populations, community development and economic development needs.

#### 2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The goals of the Community Development Department are to provide decent housing, a suitable living environment and expanded economic opportunities for the city's low-and moderate-income residents. The CDD strives to accomplish these goals by maximizing and effectively utilizing all available funding resources to conduct housing and community development activities that will serve the economically disadvantaged residents of the city. By addressing need and creating opportunity at the individual and neighborhood levels, the CDD hopes to improve the quality of life for all residents of Fort Smith. These goals are further explained as follows:

- Providing decent housing means helping homeless persons obtain appropriate housing and
  assisting those at risk of homelessness; continue collaborating with homeless providers to supply
  a continuum of services; preserving the affordable housing stock; and increasing the supply of
  supportive, transitional, and permanent housing.
- Improve the condition and availability of affordable housing over the five-year plan by improving the condition of housing for low-income homeowners; increasing the viability for potential homeownership opportunities; increasing the number of newly constructed homes available on the affordable housing market in Fort Smith; support the increase of the housing supply available to low-income renters; and expanding the funding available for affordable housing programs.
- Providing a suitable living environment entails improving the safety and livability of neighborhoods; increasing access to quality facilities and services; and reducing the isolation of income groups within the area through de-concentration of low-income housing opportunities.
- Expanding economic opportunities involves creating jobs that are accessible to low- and moderate-income persons; making mortgage financing available for low- and moderate-income persons at reasonable rates; providing access to credit for development activities that promote long-term economic and social viability of the community; and empowering low-income persons to achieve self-sufficiency to reduce generational poverty in federally-assisted public housing.

#### 3. Evaluation of past performance

As of May 15, 2020, all Program Year 2018 CDBG projects have been completed with the exception of the Riverview Hope Campus (RHC) parking lot reconstruction project for Program Year 2018 & 2019. The RHC project is now substantially complete, 2018 Funds expended and should be finished before the endof the Program Year 2019 (June 30, 2020). The Fort Smith Housing Rehabilitation Assistance Program has been suspended (with the exception of emergencies) as of March 17, 2020 due to the National COVID-19 Health Crisis currently there is \$40,448.44 left to be expended to close out the project. It is not known at this time when this program will resume.

All Program Year (PY) 2018 HOME Program funds have been fully expended and will be reported in the next CAPER. The Program Year 2019 HOME New Single Family Construction funds have been fully expended except for program income / project proceeds. Once these pre-sold homes go to the closing table, the program income / project proceeds will continue to build affordable single family homes that are pre-sold to income qualified homebuyers. PY 2019 HOME Down Payment Assistance funds have now begun to be expended.

Unfortunately, the City did not receive the Program Year 2019 CDBG and HOME funding approval documents until December 2019, however as of this date (May 15, 2020) \$200,745.74 has been expended out of the 2019 CDBG funds of \$868,033.00 and \$362,269.81 has been expended out of 2019 HOME funds of \$419,704.00. Both expended amounts include Program Income or HOME Recaptured funds. As of May 15, 2020 43.7% of the total of \$1,287,737 from both funds have been expended after entering many of

the agreements with organizations in mid December 2020. Even with the delays, progress has been good and CDBG timeliness will was met on May 2, 2020 at a rate of .81 including CDBG program income.

#### 4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

The initial notice that went out was the "Notice of Funding Availability" to organizations to assist the city with carrying out the goals, objectives and strategies of the 5 Year Consolidated Plan for Program Year 2020. That notice was published on January 2, 2020 and on January 15, 2020 and provided information about the required Application Workshop which was held on January 16, 2020 for staff to provide technical assistance to those contemplating an application. No citizen led proposals were requested at the meeting. The application deadline was on February 4, 2020 at 4:30 p.m. On March 5, 2020 a legal notice was published, a mail-out and electronic messages were distributed to notify all parties of the public hearings for input and as specified in the City's Citizen Participation Plan.

The Community Development Advisory Committee (CDAC) met in a regular session on January 9, 2020 at noon in the Board Room of the Main Library to vote on a chairperson, a vice-chair, a secretary and then were provided with assistance with the ZoomGrants Programs and questions were answered about expenditure of funds from the previous program year.

Public input meetings were held on Thursday, March 12, 2020 at the Elm Grove Community Center in the Oak Room at 9 a.m., 2 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. to offer the public an opportunity to provide feedback on the projects proposed. These meetings were advertised in the newspaper on March 5, 2020 and interested persons and agencies were notified by email and press releases. The citizen participation list was notified by mail and electronic messages.

A final public hearing was held at the Fort Smith Convention Center located at 55 South 7th Street, Exhibit Hall A1 and A2 at 6 p.m. subsequently the Board of Directors approved Resolution R-41-20.

The draft 2020 Annual Action Plan for public review was announced to the public on April 15, 2020, which initiated a 30-day public review period. The review and comment period ended at 4:00 p.m. on May 14, 2020 and no comments were received. A certification has been uploaded to indicate no comments recieved. This FINAL report is currently available for downloaded and printing from the CDD Website: www.fortsmithar.gov.

#### 5. Summary of public comments

During the four public hearings there were not public comments made. Organizations did make presentations of proposals to assist the city in carrying out the goals, objectives and strategies of the 5 Year Consolidated Plan during these hearings.

The review and comment period ended at 4:00 p.m. on May 14, 2020 and no comments were received. A certification has been uploaded to indicate no comments recieved.

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#### 6. Summary of comments or views not accepted and the reasons for not accepting them

The review and comment period ended at 4:00 p.m. on May 14, 2020 and no comments were received. A certification has been uploaded to indicate no comments recieved. .

#### 7. Summary

The city continued the normal processes as described in the City's Citizen Participation Plan, the NOFA, Application Workshp and was able to hold the standard three public heaings on March 12, 2020 just prior to the COVID-19 becoming a major national health issue requiring social distancing. The week before these March 12, 2020 public hearings, the staff offered to and allowed agencies to take advantage of presenting propsals via cell phone before the Community Development Adviosry Committee. Four of the agencies did present in that manner and there were no issues. The committee was able to ask questions and the presenter was able to answer questions to their satisfaction.

Next the funding recommendations are presented to the Board of Directors in study session, however due to the Novel Coronavirus recommendations and eventually orders from the Governor of no more than 10 people gathering the study sessions were and have been canceled. The last public hearing was still able to be held in at the City's Convention Center with plenty of space and chairs set at six feet apart. The FS Fire Department was on hand with questionaires about COVID-19 and took temperatures. The public hearing was also live streamed for those that did not wish to attend. No public comments were made during the public hearing. The Board of Directors did ask questions about the projects, monitoring and the COVID-19 allocations.

During the 30 day review and comment no comments were received.

#### 1. Introduction

As part of the consolidated planning process, as the lead agency, the CDD must consult with a wide variety of organizations in order to gain understanding of the housing and community development stage. This represents a collective effort from a broad array of entities in Fort Smith, ranging from advocacy groups for the disabled to economic development organizations, and city leaders. Private, non-profit and public organizations, including, persons interested in the CDBG and HOME programs, and persons associated with Continuum of Care organizations were contacted through several means, such as, e-mail correspondence, telephone calls and face-to-face interactions. These persons were solicited to discuss housing and community development needs in Fort Smith, including the ranking of those needs and activities that the CDD might consider in better addressing needs throughout the city. Further, individuals were asked to provide additional insight into prospective barriers and constraints to addressing housing and community development needs in Fort Smith.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

The city provides for an annual meeting of all funding agencies to coordinate activities and additionally provides Certificates of Consistency with the 5 Year Consolidated Plan. These certificates allow the agencies to apply to other areas of the federal and state government grant and / or loan programs including tax credits.

The city staff also conducts a Housing Partners meeting every second Wednesday of the month at the main library to discuss issues with projects and clients with special needs. This includes the CHDO which is also a CAP agency and uses weatherization funds, SNAP and other home repairs resources.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The staff frequently talks to officers with the Old Fort Homeless Coalition about services that are provided and where there is a great need such as families with children. The city staff has had discussions with both the Community Rescue Mission and the Salvation Army about CDBG funding. The Salvation Army received public services funds in PY 2019 for the first time to provide rapid rehousing. The Community Rescue Mission is new to CDBG and has requested utility assistance and the purchase and installation of commercial laundry equipment. The Community Rescue Mission has changes it's mission to provide for homeless families.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS

The Old Fort Homeless Coalition meets with the Arkansas Department of Health about allocation of ESG funds since the city does not receive a direct allocation, however the city does provide the Certificates of Consistency with the 5 Year Consolidated Plan for each agency that applies in ESG.

The citizen participation process began with the placing of notices on January 2, 2020 in the local newspaper, a mail-out and electronic messages to those on the 2020 Citizen Participation List. Additional funding will come from program income (including HOME recaptured funds).

The City of Fort Smith is supportive of the Fort Smith Continuum of Care, addressing issues related to homeless in the region. Funding for homeless projects and services are sources primarily through that process. The City staff was involved in the opening of the Riverview Hope Campus and has provided information about the campus as requested by citizens. Last year the city supported the campus by providing CDBG funds for case management for homeless persons and additional funding to complete the Phase 1 parking lot reconstruction.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The Fort Smith Continuum of Care, the coalition of local homeless service agencies, conducts annual surveys of homeless individuals, including unsheltered persons. These surveys serve to help focus agency activities for the coming year, as well as provide documentation in response to HUD program requirements. The unsheltered now have the opportunity to enter First Step Homeless facilities at the Riverview Hope Campus with fewer restrictions in an effort to eliminate unsheltered persons in Fort Smith. The facilities have kennels for pets since most homeless will not leave their pet.

## Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

CDBG Public Service has provided \$9,093.75 for utility assistance for the HOPE campus. Additionally replacement of the commercial laundry equipment in the amount of \$11,000 in CDBG funds located at 301 South "E" Street for the Riverview Hope Campus. Additionally, \$61,245 in CDBG funds is provided for the installation of a safe room / storm shelter and \$27,520 to for the Children's Emergency Shelter to rehabilitate the kitchen at 3015 South 14th Street. Child care fees and rehabilitation of the fence is budgeted at \$9,093.76 in public service funds and \$20,000.00, respectively, for the Crisis Internvention Center. The Community Rescue Mission is funded for the first time with \$6,093.75 in public service funds for utility assistance to the homeless shelter for families with children as well as \$7,000.00 for capital replacement of the commercial laundry equipment. The Next Step Day Room is funded at \$11,093.75 for transitional homeless case mangement and utility assistance.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were

## recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Fort Smith has plans that would affect transitional housing by providing for utility assistance and case managment in an effort to get those persons and families back into permanent housing. The Riverview Hope Campus emergency shelter will receive funding as described in the previous paragraph. With the current COVID-19 national health crisis additional funds will be provided to address the prevention, preparation and response to the virus especially among homeless persons.

All other activities for shelters and transtional housing is described in the section above.

No other projects are being considered to emergency shelters or transitional housing needs of homeless persons in the coming year beyond projects identified above that provide for improvements of emergency shelter and transitional housing facilities.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Through the city's housing rehabilitation assistance program the city will continue to work with those being discharged from medical facilities to get back home through accessible ramps, bathrooms and any other physical barriers. The city continues to assist the non-profit agencies to provide funds for public services for the identified groups described. No other actions are planned for this annual action plan.

#### Discussion

The participants in the Continuum of Care work closely together to meet the needs of homeless individuals and families through the continuum of services coordinated through the partnership. The city continues to be a partner to effect the improvements to the emergency shelter through the Riverview Hope Center and the shelters for the Crisis Intervention Center, the Community Rescue Mission, Next Step Day Room and the Fort Smith Children's Shelter.

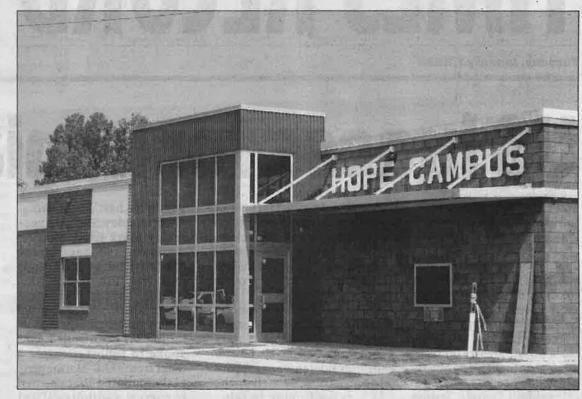

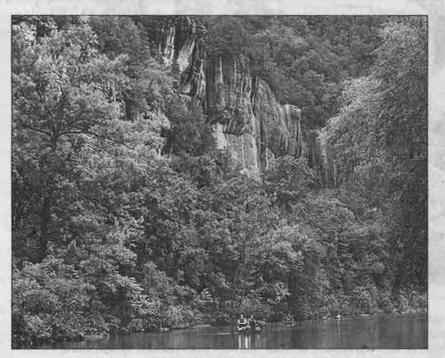

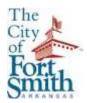

Any CDBG funds not entirely spent by an agency or canceled due to closure will transfer to the Fort Smith Housing Assistance Program. On December 31, 2021 (or earlier if all construction projects have started) all un-programmed funding will be transferred to the Housing Assistance Program with no administrative funds reduction from the original entitlement allocation.

SECTION 9: Any P. Y. 2020 HOME project not commenced by December 31, 2021 will be canceled and the funding will transfer to the Down payment Assistance Program (DPA) account code 4107190002-70-DP with the exception of the 15% CHDO Reserve funds. All HOME program income received by the City will be distributed as follows: 90 % to the Down payment Assistance Program account code 4107190002-70-DP and 10% for HOME program administration account code 4107190002-70-FS. HOME recaptured funds will be used according to federal regulations through the DPA program – no administrative funds can be deducted. All agency held Program Income / Project Proceeds will continue to be used in the new construction or acquire, rehabilitate and resale project.

SECTION 10: Subject to approval of form by the City Attorney, the City Administrator or his authorized agent is authorized to execute any documents related to real property transactions that are funded

with the CDBG and / or HOME funds; this includes but is not limited to deeds, mortgage releases, and subordination agreements.

SECTION 11: The City Administrator is authorized to execute all grant documents and certifications required by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The City Administrator or his authorized agent will be designated as the Environmental Certifying Officer.

**SECTION 12:** Any activity that is proposed to be altered in terms of its purpose, scope, location, or beneficiaries to such an extent that it can no longer reasonably be construed as the activity reviewed by the public and approved by the Fort Smith Board of Directors will be canceled.

SECTION 13: The City Administrator or his designated agent is authorized to prepare and transmit any documents required by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) related to the CDBG COVID-19 funds as a result of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act. The CARES funds in the amount of Five hundred-thirty thousand, eight hundred-forty dollars (\$530,840) shall be used to prevent, prepare for and respond to the coronavirus as budgeted by the attached budget sheet. A Committee of subject matter experts will recommend funding based on need and expenditures, and all expenditures and approved funding will be reported to the Board of Directors at least once per month for the first six months and then quarterly thereafter. Appropriate funding includes but is not limited to the procurement of services, equipment, and/or materials needed by agencies to respond to the national health crisis. The city will administer CARES funds with the guidance provided by the U. S. Department of HUD.

Re: Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act

#### CDBG COVID-19 Funds

The Community Development department has been notified of an additional allocation of CDBG funds for the specific use to prevent, prepare and respond to the coronavirus. As you are aware the President signed the CARES Act on Friday, March 27.

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has sent Congressional offices the CARES Act CDBG allocations. Congressman Womack has notified the Mayor that \$530,840 is allocated to Fort Smith.

I have added Paragraph 13 to the Board of Directors resolution to expedite these funds to get them out into the LMI community as soon as possible.

The city's citizen participation plan provides an exemption to the citizen participation plan under the CDBG National Objective of "Urgent Need". This plan is online and the exemption is on page 7. I have appended it below:

#### **Activities Exempt from Substantial Amendment Citizen Participation Requirements**

#### **Urgent Needs**

It may be necessary to amend the Consolidated Plan in the event of an emergency such as a natural disaster. These amendments may include funding new activities and / or the reprogramming of funds including canceling activities to meet community development needs that have a particular urgency. Therefore, the City of Fort Smith, acting through the Community Development Department may utilize its CDBG or HOME funds to meet an urgent need without the normal public comment period, which is otherwise required for substantial amendments.

To comply with the national objective of meeting community development needs having a particular urgency, an activity will alleviate existing conditions that the City of Fort Smith certifies:

- Pose a serious and immediate threat to the health and welfare of the community;
- Are of recent origin or recently became urgent;
- The City and the Community Development Department are unable to finance the activity on their own;
- Other resources of funding are not available to carry out the activity.

A condition will generally be considered to be of recent origin if it is developed or became critical within eighteen (18) months preceding the Community Development Department's certification;

To move quickly on COVID-19 needs in our community, we are recommending a committee be formed with subject matter experts and recommend approvals of funding for agencies directly responding to the health crisis. These awards of funding will be subject to HUD guidance documents which have yet to be issued. They will report expenditures to the Board of Directors within 10 days after the month has ended. This committee would be comprised of members of the Sebastian County Health Department and the Sebastian County Emergency Management & Public Safety Departments, etc.

#### **CDBG CARE Act Exemptions**

#### **Provisions Related to the CDBG Allocation**

- Extends the deadline for submission of the FY19 and FY20 con plan/action plans. Due date is now August 16, 2021.
- Suspends the 15% cap on public services, including FY19 and FY20 CDBG funds
- 5-day public comment period
- Eliminates in-person public hearings, but allows virtual hearings
- Suspends in-person public hearings; allows grantees the option of holding virtual hearings.
- Allows HUD to waive further program requirements (except for requirements related to fair housing, nondiscrimination, labor standards, and the environment).

I do not recommend delaying submission of the PY 2020 Annual Action Plan because it would delay getting the funds into our community by two months or more.

Although the citizen participation plan allows the exemption, there will still be a 5 day public comment period on the use of these funds.

I recommend that the Board of Directors approve the resolution to allow staff to expedite all CDBG funds to respond to the national health crisis.

#### **CDBG and HOME Funding for Program Year 2020**

As you are aware this is the first time in several years that the city has been notified of the actual allocations prior to the public hearings. All Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership Act (HOME) funds listed in this memo and the resolution are actual numbers for the Board of Directors consideration. Both CDBG & HOME programs received increases as noted in the table below. Additionally, the Trump Administration 2021 Budget Proposal includes the elimination of both CDBG and HOME funding.

#### **Annual Action Plan for Program Year 2020**

The Community Development Advisory Committee (CDAC) held three public hearings on March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2020, to review funding requests for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership Act Program funds from the local agencies to assist the city in carrying out the goals and objectives of the Five Year Consolidated Plan for PY 2020. At the close of the final public hearing, the CDAC members met to consider funding recommendations to the Fort Smith Board of Directors. The committee reviewed all outside agency applications for CDBG and HOME funds in the requested amount of \$846,970. All recommended projects meet the Five Year Consolidated Plan for 2016 – 2020 Goals, Objectives and Strategies as adopted by the Board of Directors by Resolution R-59-16 on May 3, 2016.

The following table reflects those priorities as they relate to the Program Year 2020 allocations:

#### CDBG & HOME Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) Timeline

To meet deadlines imposed by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the Annual Action Process, the staff prepares two different schedules in December each year before the first legal notice is published. The staff schedule is marked as Attachment 5 and the applicant schedule is noted Attachment 6.

As of the date of this memo, staff is not aware of any regulatory relief from these HUD regulated deadlines.

#### **ZoomGrants™**

This is the fifth funding year that ZoomGrants was used by agencies to submit applications for funding. The CDAC was provided with access to all the documentation within ten days of the application deadline (Feb. 4, 2020) to review applications and to begin the scoring process. Use of the ZoomGrants program is estimated to save \$26,028.00 annually from CDBG & HOME administration funds. The annual fee for the service is \$4,500 which leaves an estimated total net savings per year of \$21,528. This program is now used by many CDBG entitlement communities across the country. Not only does it take CDAC through the funding and scoring processes but also allows city staff to prepare the agency agreements online with digital signatures, submit agency pay requests, monitor projects and report the number of low income clients served. All data is owned by the City of Fort Smith even if the service is discontinued.

#### **Applicant Scoring**

As it relates to scoring each application, the scoring criteria is marked as Attachment 7. Some applicants have been disappointed in the score every year and in the past board members have noted the differences in the scores. The policies currently require a minimum match of 10% for CDBG and a 15% match in the HOME program. HUD requires that the city leverage CDBG and HOME funds with other funding sources and this is the way to determine it. The minimum match does not receive any points. To score the full 20 points on Question 2 in the Public Service category, it is easier to fully match an application that has a maximum request of \$20,000 in the category than the other three categories which do not have a maximum request. New agencies to the program also receive no points in Score Question 1 if they have never had experience administering a federally funded project. That does not mean they should not be funded, scoring is a guideline for funding recommendations.

#### **Project Recommendations**

The CDBG and HOME funding recommendations follow this memo. After the recommendations is a map with each application assigned a letter in alphabetical order containing applicant information and recommended funding, scoring report and the substantial information from the applications. Conflicts of Interest are as noted in applications and in Attachment 8.



This year 23 applications were submitted which is one more than last year's funding cycle. Five pre-applications were started but did not complete the process or were not qualified to move to full submission. A graph for the previous five years is marked as Attachment 9. The committee and city staff listened to applicant proposals during the three public hearings held on March 12<sup>th</sup>. Upon closing the public hearing at 5:30 p.m., the committee members deliberated and reached a consensus on the submitted funding requests. Their recommendations are presented to the Fort Smith Board of Directors in this memo.

#### Homeless and the Downtown Entertainment District (CBID)

These recommendations do not fund any services provided in the Central Business Improvement District (CBID). All recommended public service activities are not provided in the CBID and are related to moving the homeless off of the streets.

The last page of this memo indicates agencies that are funded through United Way and these programs and United Way.

#### Homeless Category - Category 1

This category received five applications, two were from the Fort Smith Children's Shelter (FSCS). One application each was received from the Community Rescue Mission, Crisis Intervention Center and Riverview Hope Campus. This represents three more applications than last year. The funding for this category is based on the Five Year Consolidated Plan which is 15% or \$135,350.

All CDAC Members present approved these recommendations. Further they approved moving the leftover \$8,585 left in this category to Category 3 (these funds cannot be moved to Public Service due to the 15% maximum HUD regulation).



#### Public Service Category – Category 2

The public service category received six applications, which is three more than last year's funding cycle. These funds are not used for salaries but rather for a service that is as close to the beneficiary as possible (i.e., meals on wheels bulk food, dental services, utilities assistance, case management etc.).

As it relates to specific homeless provider activities in public service, the Next Step Homeless Services application is for utilities and case management at the transitional housing facilities outside of the CBID (addresses shown in application attached), Riverview Hope Campus for utilities and on site case management and Community Rescue Mission for utilities. Federal regulations do not allow the City to use more than 15% of the entire CDBG allocation (plus program income) for the public service category which is \$135,500. The CDAC members wanted to fund more projects, however federal regulations prevent the percentage of funds from being increased above 15%. We continue to see new applicants in this category as money becomes tighter since the city is not funding agencies out of the sales tax fund. These activities are not duplicative services as confirmed by Hope Campus officials. All public service activities are related to the City's anti-poverty strategy (Attachment 10) in the Five Year Consolidated Plan.



#### Community Development Category – Category 3

The community development category received one application from Crawford-Sebastian Community Development Council, Inc. This year they proposed the purchase of affordable housing lots. This Category was not opened for agency rehabilitation due to Goal 6 of the Five Year Plan calling for \$54,950 per year of CDBG funds directed towards the purchase of the affordable lots. The first year was funded in that manner but by the next year these funds were not spent so it was opened to agency rehabilitation in Years 2, 3 & 4. Accordingly the plan called for a five year expenditure of \$274,750 for lots and \$90,000 for agency rehabilitation. This year the entire category was directed towards lot purchase in an attempt to meet five year goals.

Outside agency funds of \$85,725 were available plus the \$8,585 carried over for a total of \$94,310 (the Fort Smith Housing Assistance Program is funded at \$342,900).

#### HOME Investment Partnership Act / Community Development Housing Organization (CHDO) - Category 4

One agency applied in this category. Crawford-Sebastian Community Development Council, Inc. (CSCDC), submitted as a Community Development Housing Organization (CHDO). The proposal is to either construct five new affordable homes or to acquire, rehabilitate, and resale existing single family homes. The amount recommended is \$394,586. Additional funds will be generated from the sales of the homes. The CSCDC-CHDO continues its partnership with the Fort Smith Housing Authority (FSHA) to undertake the affordable housing projects.

#### **PY 2019 Amendment Request**

In the previous year's program a project was recommended by CDAC and approved by the Board to provide Down-Payment Assistance (DPA) from the HOME program at \$93,365 with each income qualified homebuyer not to exceed \$5,000 in assistance. The CSCDC, Inc. has requested that the project allow for up to \$10,000 in down-payment / closing cost assistance for income qualified homebuyers. The Arkansas Development Finance Authority (ADFA) is now providing \$10,000. The CDAC recommends approval of the amendment to the Board of Directors. The request is marked as Attachment "E"



#### **CDAC Recommendations**

The table on page five lists all funding *recommendations* by the CDAC with the pre-programmed City's Housing Assistance Program, administrative costs, and CDBG un-programmed funds. We are pleased to report that all agencies submitting applications for funding were on time and complete, and we extend our thanks for their hard work and use of the online system. All projects were matched by at least the minimum required by the CDBG and HOME programs (10% and 15% respectively).

Program income continues to be generated by the city's housing assistance program, nonprofit partners, and the FSHA which continues to be reused for affordable housing and housing assistance projects. The expenditure of City program income is reported annually in the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) which is online at the city's website and provided to the Board of Directors once the report is accepted by the Department of HUD.

In summary, we request the Board of Directors approve the 2020 projects and the PY 2019 Amendment recommended by the CDAC.

We will be available at the Board of Directors voting session on April 7th.

#### **Budget Narrative**

As a general rule, it is recommended foods enter their proper temperature zones within 2 hours. For cold foods, the food safe temperature is 40 degrees Fahrenheit and below. The new Antioch Community Pantry has been equipment with new energy saving HVAC system to properly control the temperatures in the storage area for non perishable and fresh produce items. It is just as important in the wintertime to keep certain foods from freezing as it is to keep food from getting too hot. Likewise, the entire building has been rewired and equipped with energy saving LED lighting. Additionally, an outside forklift accessible freezer has been coated with energy saving foam and the ceiling in the western-facing part of the building has been similarly sprayed with foam. Insulation has been added to the western wall and a passive energy saving walkway will now keep heat off the front façade.

Over 70% of the food distributed by Antioch is perishable.

The electrical expense has been project based upon current year billing extrapolated for next year. A budget of \$1,490 per month is projected for electricity at an annual cost of \$17,880. Outlays for gas during the coldest months is estimated at \$600 per month for four months, with an annual cost of \$2,400 for gas. The total annual utility budget of \$20,280. Antioch is not including water and sanitation in its utility estimates. The HVAC system is a combination electric/gas system. The temperature control budget is for heat during the four coldest months at roughly \$800 per month.

The funding request applies solely to Antioch's new expanded facility at 1420 North 32nd Street. Please note that this location is in the process of being added to Antioch's current business license at 1122 North 11th Street. Both locations are considered pantry operational locations. Ms. Tidwell's home on North 46th Circle is the official address of the non profit organization.

To the best of the writer's knowledge, the Antioch Community Food Pantry is the only food pantry serving Fort Smith households that has a receiving dock to accept large trucks without hydraulic liftgates, an outside freezer capable of accepting and storing a full truckload of frozen products and similarly the refrigerated space to handle a large quantity of goods such as eggs, milk, cheeses and other perishables.

How will or does your agency market the services or facilities or the affordable housing to the community?

Antioch principally markets its agency services through its Facebook page and website. The Facebook page now has 2,500 followers. In addition, Antioch conducts community outreach through its twelve mobile pantry operations. Antioch reaches low income seniors, the disabled and struggling families living at Gorman Towers, Mid-Town Apartments, Nelson Homes, Coleman Commons, West Apartments, and Allied Apartments. It also has reached out to struggling veterans through the Veterans Affairs Clinic. Over 600 families receive food assistance through the VA alone, with another 2,000 receiving assistance through the other outreach. In addition, Antioch places two community service pages each year with the Times Record. For special events, like Antioch After the Flood, Antioch in the Park at Thanksgiving and the Antioch Senior Community Christmas Dinner, flyers are prepared and distributed through local government agencies, retail parking lot handouts, churches and other organizations assisting low-to-moderate income individuals.

Established in 1981, Community Rescue Mission (CRM) is a 50I (c) 3 faith-based Christian organization that helps families and children suffering from homelessness get back on their feet and resume independent, healthy, productive lives. We provide safe shelter, meals, spiritual enrichment, case management, clothing, wellness checks, life skill classes, assistance with job search and placement, and finding housing.

A. Last year, we were able to help secure 186 job placements and get 146 families into homes of their own. Among the families we served were 233 children.

- B. Over the last five years, significant changes have been made to position CRM to serve families and children. These changes can be seen in board policies which focus our services on families and children and in financial commitments to strengthen our staff and programs, while tending to vital maintenance issues.
- C. Programs have been instituted which build family relationships, and a volunteer organization is in place.
- D. CRM vigorously pursues partnerships and continues to cultivate relationships throughout the community.
- E. We serve homeless people from throughout Arkansas as they find their way to Fort Smith. Most come from a seven-county area including Sebastian, Crawford, Franklin, Leflore, Scott, Logan and Sequoyah Counties.
- F. Our capacity is 55-70 people depending on the number of children families have in tow when they arrive. We have the greatest capacity in the city to serve families and children. Future long-range plans will increase our capacity.
- G. While we service primarily families and children, we can, and do assist single women who are homeless in our Family Center, as space permits. We can also accommodate up to a few single men with children in another area of our campus.

### How will or does your agency market the services or facilities or the affordable housing to the community?

Community Rescue Mission has been in our community for 39 years and we work diligently to share our mission with other organizations throughout our community. We have multiple social media accounts, meet with Spirit 106 monthly, joined the Fort Smith Chamber and look for organizations that will allow us to present information about our organization. We joined the 100 Family initiative and have a strong relationship with over 25 churches in our area.

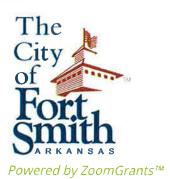

Community Rescue Mission is a homeless shelter for families. We have been in existence since

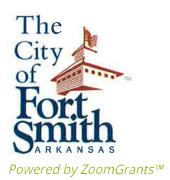

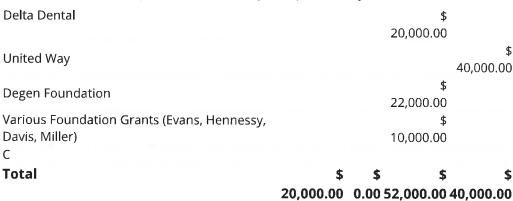

#### **Budget Narrative**

The Community Dental Clinic has been meeting the basic dental needs for the city's low income citizens for over 20 years. Our clinic is the only full service nonprofit dental clinic in the city of Fort Smith service area to provide professional dental care at no cost to low income individuals and families. We are conducting regular clinics 3 and sometimes 4 times per week, receiving regular referrals from Riverview Hope Campus, Harbor House, Gateway House, Good Samaritan Clinic, Next Step Day Room and other agencies. We address the needs of patients in pain, those needing basic dental care as well as preventative dental care.

Many of our patients are considered to have compromised health conditions which is due to various reasons. Because of the health condition of these individuals, treatments may take longer than for an average patient and may require additional visits to obtain the needed results. We have a dedicated group of volunteer dentists and other dental staff who give expert care to our patients addressing tooth decay

issues, broken or abscessed tooth issues, and denture needs. When these issues are resolved, patients immediately feel better, can eat healthier foods, and their overall health improves. By freeing them of oral pain they can continue to work or seek gainful employment which helps them provide for their families.

It can be easily said that 2019 was a tremendously successful year for the dental clinic. Our clinic was able to provide over \$750,000 dollars of dental treatment last year. One word accurately describes the last year, "amazing"! We have been blessed to have several returning volunteer dentists, and to have many volunteer dental hygienists and registered dental assistants working at our clinic. With the help of the city of Fort Smith's Community Development Block Grant funding along with other community partner's support, the dental clinic was able to make significant medical technology, equipment, and supply upgrades.

This past year we were able to add two new operative chairs, to replace worn out chairs that were no longer functional. From digital x-ray with hand held notepads for operative viewing of x-ray images to dental hand tools, we have a well-equipped dental care facility. These changes have provided our volunteer dentists with the resources they need to enable them to see a larger volume of patients and provide high quality dental care. These technology upgrades have reduced average treatment times and allowed for more patients to be seen during clinics. This increase in patient volume increases our need for additional funding for patient supplies such as patient bib, gauze, sterilization equipment, sterilization bags, lab coats, gloves, and numbing agents. CDBG funding provides \$50 for each patient to cover a portion of the costs of their dental treatments. Your funding contributes to our ability to offer high quality dental care to those who would not otherwise have access to dental care. Every client receives an initial exam which includes oral cancer screening. We take x-ray's to evaluate patients and provide necessary dental treatments which may include fillings, extractions, and dental cleanings. If needed, we make referrals of patients to endodontists who perform root canal and crown procedures at low or no costs. These procedures are needed before we can provide partial dentures to some of our patients. We also refer clients to oral surgeons who provide services to our clients at low or no costs.

Denture program funding provided by Delta Dental for FY2020 will allow us to provide dentures to 75 patients as we are able to purchase a full set of dentures for a lab fee of \$600 (all fees included) and partials for \$300 (all fees included). This is 75% below normal denture costs. These are high quality dentures that will last patients for many years. These dentures do not only restore one's ability to eat a healthier diet but they restore a patients smile. This service helps restore a patients self esteem and self confidence, it can be life changing.

We have many client success stories from our denture program where we have changed the lives of our clients for the better. A recent patient, Ms. Hice, is a single mom who was attending Vista College for a medical assistant degree. She was told by the organization, where she was completing her externship, that she would never be hired due to the fact she had no teeth. She had said that they judged her only by her appearance and not her abilities to do the job. One of the first things we noticed about her when she came into the clinic is that she kept her hand over her mouth as she explained that she had been battling a medical condition that contributed to her tooth loss. Ms. Hice indicated she had reached a low point in her life, she felt that her attempt to better herself could have been for nothing. We quickly gave her an appointment, and in just 6 weeks we were able to provide her with dentures, restoring not only her beautiful smile, but her self-confidence and self-esteem. She told us that she could not

wait to tryout her new smile. The best part is that we were able to do this before her graduation.

We also have been able to help so many of our Hope Campus patients who are working so hard to better their lives and are in need of a fresh start. We always have a sense of great joy when these patients receive their dentures. So many times they are overcome with such great emotion that they don't even recognize themselves. It's such a wonderful moment to give them the gift of a new smile.

Our clinic also performs oral cancer screenings for patients. Our dentists have detected oral cancer in some of our patients and made referrals for further diagnosis and treatment. This process has been a life saving event for some of our patients. The cost of these screenings is money well spent.

The services the Community Dental Clinic provides are in response to the needs of the underserved low income population in our community for a dental clinic whose mission is to relieve dental pain, restore dignity, and promote self-sufficiency by providing basic dental care in the most cost effective way.

#### **Budget Narrative**

In 2019, Crisis Intervention Center Brighter Beginnings Child Care provided free services to 84 children ages 6 weeks through 6 years, while they resided in our domestic violence and sexual assault safe shelter with their family. 38 children ages 6 through 17 years of age received free childcare services and mentoring programs while their parents in shelter attended appointments, group sessions, therapy sessions and classes. 32 children were provided evening care and activity time while their parents in attended evening classes or worked later shifts. These services are vital to the parent who has fled an abusive situation and would not be free at any other facility. Below is a breakdown of the cost sheet that is provided to families who are choosing our center as private pay providers:

Full Time Attendance - 5 to 10 hours daily Infant - \$29.98 daily Toddler - \$28.00 daily Preschool - \$24.78 daily

Half Time Attendance - 3 to 5 hours daily Infant - \$22.49 daily Toddler - \$21.00 daily Preschool - \$18.59 daily

Part Time Attendance - less than three hours of care and may not be consecutive days Infant - \$14.99 daily
Toddler - \$14.00 daily
Preschool - \$12.39 daily

Food costs for breakfast, lunch and snack are based on the Federal Registry and could be as high as \$6.01 daily.

While serving 84 children in 2019, the cost to the parents in shelter could have been as high as \$12,591.60 for care and \$2524.20 for food for a total of \$15,11.58 for care and food services. CIC also provides the bottles, formula, diapers, wipes and hygiene/cleaning products for infants in our care that reside in our shelter. This cost could exceed \$4000 yearly if the majority of children served were infants and toddlers. Families who have moved into permanent housing from the shelter also have access to the free child care facility while they continue to attend groups sessions, therapies and appointments relating to the abuse they suffered. While serving another 38 children while the parents attended certain meetings appointments and classes, the cost to families could have been as high as \$3532.10. The costs listed above total \$22647.90 of community investment into the lives of children in need of day care services.

Low to moderate income families already in shelter are in need of our quality goods and services to help them move forward into permanent housing and a safe, abuse free living environment. Our free service to them allows them the freedom of knowing they can do the daily tasks needed to ensure their future while their child/children are being cared for in a quality, certified and safe program. We have a trust and bond with our residents and this service is a great asset to the families in shelter and the community. It helps keep the family from failing and keeps the children in the home instead of in foster care.

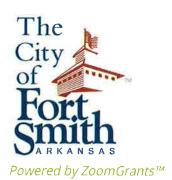
Our Better Beginnings State Licensed Child Care facility has been in operation for many years. Families in shelter have free access to the child care services so the parent can attend medical appointments, housing appointments. legal appointments and court dates, and job interviews. The children in the shelter are considered homeless and deserve quality day care. The abusive environment that the child has endured is understood at CIC because all of our teachers are trauma trained and informed providers. We have MOUs with local child therapy providers so that speech, occupational and physical therapists come to CIC to see the children in need. DHS and CASA also have distinct protocols with us so they may serve the families as well. Under the direction of our new CEO in 2018, we made more slots available to local families that have foster children in need of day care services. We added a new certified staff position to be in compliance with student to teacher ratios. We are licensed to serve up to 36 children under the age of five, depending on age breakdowns and ratios, and we see the need to expand hours and services.

We currently have 3 full time certified teachers and 2 part time teachers. Sebastian County has had more than 600 children in foster care in recent months, many of which are in need of day time care so foster parents can go to work. This increase in the level of our services in vital to the children, the program and the facility. Our services are vital to the community. Serving child victims of domestic violence is complex and we are fully trained and prepared. The parents in the shelter can not afford the day care rates at any child care facility. They are searching for permanent housing and employment and need our support. We propose that the funds requested be used to supplement the cost of qualified child care services for the local children residing in the shelter.

Crisis Intervention Center actively promotes its services at a variety of community events, such as: drug court, rehabilitation facilities, other shelters, law enforcement and judicial training, outreach events in the community, churches, civic organizations, medical providers, other human service providers and state agencies. Our Site Administrator and our CEO often speak at events that are catered to foster families. We offer a 24 hour free hotline service that provides information and referrals and we promote all of our services on radio, tv and social media outlets.

#### **Budget Narrative**

The Crisis Intervention Center is committed to ensuring the safety, security and confidentiality of the victims using its services. When a victim flees a violent situation and retains residence in our safe shelter, they are immediately considered "homeless" under the federal Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). This allows them to better qualify for needed services for themselves and any children involved. Domestic violence is the leading cause for women visiting the ER and for women missing work. On any day in the US, there are approximately 20,000 hotline calls to domestic violence centers and shelters. Crisis Intervention Center is the only safe shelter in the area for these victims. In 2019, CIC provided residential services to 364 victims for a total of 7395 bed nights and over 20,000 meals, answered over 1000 hotline calls, and provided over 7000 hours of individual advocacy and case management services. The safety and integrity of victims is a top priority to the staff and board of directors and we will continue to ensure victim safety and confidentiality to the best of our ability.

The current fencing around the property is a combination of chain link and wood privacy panels. The chain link portion is in great shape. There are several wood panels that have come loose from the support beams and need to be replaced. Also, the entire portion of the wood fencing needs to be weatherized, as has not been done since construction. 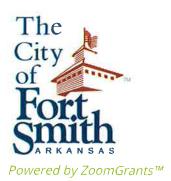

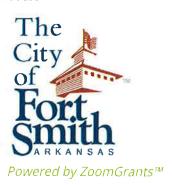

The purpose of the proposed project is to decrease hazards and increase safety standards while providing a more home-like environment to the youth in foster care that live at the Children's Shelter home. In addition, it will make the kitchen more functional for the staff to work and prepare meals (approximately 30,000 meals per year). As a CARF-accredited agency (Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities), the CES must provide and maintain a healthy, safe, and clean environment that supports quality services and minimizes the risk of harm to the persons served, personnel, and other stakeholders. In order to fulfill this requirement, the CES kitchen must be updated (including the FRP on the walls throughout the home). While each youth at the Children's Shelter is a victim, they suffer from a high degree of emotional distress and instability due to the neglect and abuse inflicted on them. It is not uncommon for a youth living at the Shelter to exhibit aggressive behavior, and struggle with emotional or physical self-control. For this reason, the kitchen must be renovated to protect all involved in the Shelter, as well as provide a more home-like environment to the children that call it "home."

The kitchen remodel project will include a total 'gut' of all kitchen cabinets, shelving, and counter tops. Some appliances will be replaced due to age and size. Electrical and plumbing work will be included. The removal of FRP from the walls will be included, and extend throughout the shelter into the resident's bedrooms. The range and refrigerator will remain.

In the summertime, the CES kitchen is used to prepare 3 home-cooked meals and 2 snacks each day for up to 16 children. During the school year, the kitchen is typically not used at lunchtime unless a child is home and not at school. Approximately 30,000 meals are served each year out of the kitchen.

The purpose of the proposed project is to provide a safe structure that can serve as both a FEMA certified storm shelter and a safe room for the residents and staff of the Children's Shelter. As a CARF-accredited agency (Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities), the CES must provide and maintain a healthy, safe, and clean environment that supports quality services and minimizes the risk of harm to the persons served, personnel, and other stakeholders. This includes implementing training, policies, and emergency plans that promote safety in all types of emergencies. The primary goal of this project would be to provide the CES residents and staff with shelter in the event of a natural disaster like a tornado, and to provide a secure location in the event of a threatening situation.

The structure will be attached to the CES home, and will be accessible from the interior and exterior of the home. It will have a concrete foundation, concrete filled CMU blocks, concrete lid ceiling, and 2 FEMA shelter doors and hardware. The exterior finishes including the carpentry, roofline, asphalt shingled room, siding, and brick will match the existing features of the CES home. An exhaust fan and light with switch will be installed. The approximate dimensions of the safe room are 4'5" x 18'9". The project will include drainage rework at the rear of the building to accommodate the safe room.

#### **Budget Narrative**

We are requesting \$15,000 in funding to help provide the Girls Inc. Experience to more girls who may not be able to afford it, making them choose other options that may be free and not safe, such as staying at home unsupervised where they would not be exposed to safe, educational, quality, supervised program initiatives. The new minimum wage increase is hitting us especially hard and will continue to do so in the coming years. We are trying to keep any service fee increases to a minimum, but this year had to go up to \$30 from \$25 to help offset some of this additional cost. Therefore, this funding continues be an even more important benefit to our low income clients.

We just completed our second year of expanded after-school program services at Howard, Trusty & Tilles Elementary Schools. This is reaching approximately 150 more girls each school year. We were able to start this initiative by receiving a grant from our National organization. The grant was given to mainly support the extra operational needs of this growth through outreach such as salaries and supplies. The main portion of the grant was given to us in 2018 with the last payment to be made in 2019, so this isn't available in 2020. The first and second year, we were able to offer our program free of charge to any girl who wanted to participate. In the upcoming year, we will have

to charge membership fees, although small, there will be a slight fee of \$30 for membership and \$30 for the program year. CDBG funds will help us still give these services free of charge by providing membership scholarships (\$30 x 100 girls) and program fee scholarships to 100 girls as well at \$30 each. These schools are all located in very low income neighborhoods. Specific low income statistics for each school we service are as follows: Howard: 96%, Trusty: 97%, Tilles: 94%.

Our funding from other sources doesn't help provide scholarships to the clients unless the Noon Exchange sponsorship is larger than the costs we incur, which hasn't ever been the case. Our United Way funds go directly into our program expenses such as staff wages, supplies, overhead, etc.

Our mission is to inspire all girls to be strong, smart and bold. Girls Inc. is part of a National organization of nearly 100 affiliates, but we are the only one in Arkansas. We are proud to celebrate 85 years of serving Fort Smith and the surrounding communities. Girls Inc. believes deeply in the fundamental rights and abilities of girls and enact these values in our direct service work. At Girls Inc. our out of school time, hands on programs and horizon-expanding experiences, delivered by professionals in a supportive, all-girl setting, equip girls to set goals, take on new challenges, and achieve their goals. In 2019, we served over 1,400 girls with more than 80% of them living in families earning \$35,000 or less and over half of them coming from single-parent families or not living with either biological parent. Our after-school, summer and outreach initiatives give girls the opportunities for fun physical activity and learn strategies around positive body image, nutrition, and avoiding violence, teen pregnancy and substance abuse. They take on STEM as areas that are "for girls," while learning that women are capable of being successful in higher paying fields. Girls build practical money management skills and confidence with concepts from savings accounts to entrepreneurship. These are just a few examples of the lasting difference we make for and with girls that sets us apart. There is no other organization that does what we do for girls with the same level of intensity, consistency and accountability. The majority of the girls we serve are elementary age (75%), but we still have several girls that participate in programming that attend junior high(25%), Nearly 50% of the girls we serve are caucasian; 17% African-American; 15% Hispanic, 12% multiracial, 3% Asian and the other being of several other ethnic groups.

Our after school program serves around 150 girls each day; our recreational athletic programs (basketball, volleyball and dance) serve approximately 600 girls each year; our outreach initiatives serve approximately 600 girls each year, with continuing growth, and our summer program serves just over 400 girls.

The funding provided for our in-center programs will be used to provide scholarships for approximately 30 girls who qualify as low-income families. Breaking it down, funds would be used as follows:

30 membership x \$30 = \$900

30 summer scholarships x \$200 (\$25 a week x 8 weeks) = \$6,1000 (includes 1 partial summer fee)

10 transportation scholarships x \$200 (\$25 a month for 8 months) = \$2,000

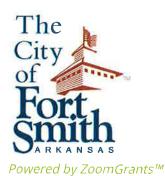

New twin size frames, box springs and mattresses, as well as protective covering, would benefits Harbor House, Inc. clients in that it would provide bedding that is comfortable, structurally sound and would aid in a more homey and welcoming environment. Many of our clients, due to their addiction and the resulting situations and events, have been homeless, living out of a trash bag and/or hopping from couch to couch. Part of the treatment experience Harbor House provides is a living environment that is safe, clean and provides a glimpse of what their future can hold - a clean bed and a good nights sleep to enhance their chances of completing school, showing up for work - creating a life.

Window covering film would assist in providing a confidential setting for our clients. Regulatory bodies - state and national - require HHI to provide a living environment in which persons outside are not able to view clients, therefore their privacy is protected and their focus can be on getting into recovery and getting a new way of life.

In one of our residential facilities, due to the space restrictions of the 100+ year old building, our clients must sleep in dorm style rooms. The bedroom areas typically have 5 men sleeping in one area. Because our living room area is so small, many of the 40+ men living in this residential facility, not only use their beds for sleeping, but at times like a couch or chair in between groups and sessions and during the evening and weekends.

This creates a situation in which the bed frames, mattresses, box springs and stain protection covers for springs and mattresses wear out much quicker than if used for the intended purpose. HHI would like to utilize CDBG funds to replace worn out bedding such as twin size bed frames, box springs, mattresses and protection covers.

In this residential facility, there is also a need for new window coverings. This is out of necessity, not for aesthetics.

State and national accreditation, certification and licensing regulatory bodies require that we provide confidential and safe environments for our clients. Over the past years, we have used a variety of window coverings - including blinds and curtains. Clients look through the blinds and the slats break or bend, with curtains, they get accidentally pulled down or dirty (with an average of 700+ clients throughout a year). Confidentiality can quickly get compromised and HHI would not be in compliance.

To alleviate this issue we would like to utilize CDBG funds to install one way reflective film that would allow clients to look out the window without the possibility of being seen from the outside, therefore protecting the client's confidentiality. This helps the client to feel like they are not being restricted or punished, yet would satisfy regulatory bodies.

# How will or does your agency market the services or facilities or the affordable housing to the community?

Services of our programs are marketed in a variety of ways - advertising, social media, our agency websites, word of mouth, etc. Harbor House, Inc. has an annual 5K Race for Recovery in September to coincide with National Recovery Month. This highlights not only recovery, but the services and programs offered by HHI - residential treatment, outpatient treatment, Specialized Women's Services (SWS) in which women bring their children with them to treatment, observational detoxification, family recovery, recovery coaching, transitional living, community diversion program and the Regional Prevention Program for the State of Arkansas.

Our Board of Directors is in the planning stages of expanded fundraising, with a focus on a new campus. Additionally, marketing of our provided services and programs, as well as continued work with partners in the Fort Smith area, assist HHI in being able to serve a population in need of varied pathways of recovery, HHI wants to help the community understand that our clients are not broken. They are stuck, and our services, employees and programs can aid clients in getting unstuck and moving toward their future - believing they have a future.

A lot of our clients are single moms and dads with very fixed incomes. We work closely with the many other agencies, business, schools etc. in our community to maximize benefits received by our clients. We encourage them to take responsibility for their children as well as the safety and quality of life for the family. We have reconstructed our Earn While You Learn program 2018 and in 2019 we have added online parenting classes to our list of services. Our online classes are available to those clients who are high-risk pregnancies and/or are employed full-time. Since our goal is self-sufficiency for our families having the online classes available so that clients who are trying to improve their financial situation, are still able to earn their crib or car seat just like those who participate in our in-office classes. Our clients who are employed full time can take online classes and it wont jeopardize their work schedule. The importance of the project to the LMI citizens of Fort Smith is high. We are providing temporary help with emergency supplies such as; diapers, cribs, formula and lifelong education and skills to help parents. By providing this low-cost project, we are saving children's lives. Upon completion of our parenting classes, clients earn a Safe new Crib, so that their children aren't co-sleeping with adults, thus saving lives. Diapers are provided to help with hygiene and health of our clients children.

According to the United Way's "Needs Assessment," a lack of affordable childcare was the number one family concern in this zip code (72901). The Fort Smith Public School System identified that 50% of the children entering Kindergarten in this area code are 2 to 3 years behind the average developmental level. Lincoln has a quality Daycare program offering our families a safe and healthy environment with lots of hands-on learning centers allowing the children to enhance their learning experience

As a United Way Agency and ABC for school Success, we can provide quality childcare for low-income infants and toddlers starting at age six weeks and preschool education to children ages 3 to 5 years old. Lincoln's Program prepares children from infancy to elementary school. The lack of funding during the Summer months leaves many 4-5-year-olds Preschoolers with no place to go and, at times being home alone with siblings that are not even old enough to care for themselves because parents have to work. And also though we offer Summer School at a lower than average tuition rate, it remains beyond the reach of many families in our service area. The Summer tuition Program will enable the Center to provide 20 children to attend a full-time program.

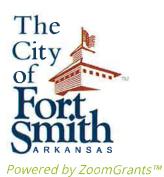

NSHS has expanded our response to the need for housing for the homeless population in our community in the last few years. We have determined that the best way to move homeless individuals and families who are all very low income out of homelessness is with an intensive case management program coupled with stable transitional housing. NSHS is asking you to support this housing program by funding a portion of our utility and case management services. We are asking for a total of \$20,000 to help defray the costs (\$19,000 for utilities and \$1000 for case management).

Based on the expenses for 2019 and forecasting a full year for our new homes, we can show utility expenses for each of our houses at the following amount:

Buddy Smith House \$15,798

Esther House \$13,975

Gabriel House \$8,300

Caldarera House \$1688

This is a total annual cost in utilities of approximately \$51,325

The \$19,000 for utility assistance would help with the above costs for the utilities of the transitional housing program.

We have professional case managers who work to provide the case management for our housing clients. The \$1000 would assist us with the services they provide.

Next Step's housing program is not located at the same address as our offices. All of our housing is located out of the main downtown of Fort Smith. Here are the addresses of our housing facilities:

NSHS case managers collect data for our housing program in order to document outcome success in that area. When a client exits one of our transitional houses by "graduating" that means they have secured permanent housing, an income source (either a job or disability), and have accumulated a savings safety net. At Next Step, our case managers accept that not all clients will succeed in our program, and usually this is because they are not willing to comply with the no drug and alcohol policy or are unwilling to maintain employment. Over the last few years, we have had a 60+% success rate in our housing program. That level of success is particularly high in the homeless services arena.

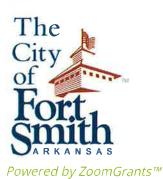

The Arc for the River Valley provides advocacy, education, and recreation for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. We provide services such as art class, cooking class, exercise class, holiday dances, talent shows, movie nights, fishing derbies, an annual trip to the Alma Water Park, participation in Special Olympics, and more. We offer these services at a low annual membership fee of \$15 per person. We are a United Way agency and we receive most of our income through our United Way allocation, along with other grants, fundraisers, foundations, and corporations. We are the only established agency in this area that provides services to people living in Oklahoma. Most of our members are low income due to their disability, so our services benefit our members because we offer an affordable membership price with many activities and programs for them to be able to participate. \$5,000 for the year of 2020-2021 will be strictly used to pay our utilities for a year so that we may use our additional income to add more programs and improve the programs that we already have produced.

Our utilities are water through the City of Fort Smith, electric through OG&E, and gas through AOG. About 30% of our monthly United Way income is allocated for these overhead expenses. If we were able to have these expenses paid through the CDBG, we could use the extra income to add programs and events for our underserved population of members.

We send a newsletter out to members, donors, and supporters every two months that keeps everyone who receives it up-to-date on our current events. We also keep our website and Facebook page up-to-date with the programs and events that take place. Times Record newspaper comes to our facility and runs stories about our programs periodically. Our Executive Director, Micayla Cole, has also been on several radio stations to discuss upcoming events. We try to utilize all media outlets to reach out to the community.

WestArk RSVP will sponsor a free tax preparation Tax Counseling for the Elderly site at the RSVP Center on the corner of Grand Avenue and 13th Street. Free federal and state tax preparation will be provided by certified IRS volunteer for a minimum of 40 hours a week from late January through mid-April and three hours weekly from May through September. Tax services will be available to taxpayers 65 years of age or older regardless of income.

Fort Smith has a large number of retirees from the manufacturing sector who receive small pensions requiring them to file annual tax returns. Tax preparation fees could eat-up two to three months of their pension.

WestArk RSVP tax volunteers receive training annually to allow them to stay current with changes to the tax code. All volunteer tax preparers require on-line access and the use of computers, printers and large monitors. Community outreach expenses aid us in reaching those in need.

WestArk RSVP volunteer Medicare Advocates receive training on multiple occasions throughout the year to allow them to stay current with changes to Medicare, the Medicare.gov website and the Access Arkansas website of the Arkansas Department of Human Services. All Medicare assistance requires online access and the use of computers, printers and large monitors. Community outreach expenses (such as mailing postcard reminders) aid us in reaching those who need our services.

WestArk RSVP trained volunteer advocates will provide individual assistance to Medicare beneficiaries by appointment each weekday.

Medicare Assistance program serves the needs of Medicare beneficiaries, both the disabled and the elderly. Approximately 29 Fort Smith residents turn 65 years of age every day and most become Medicare eligible on that day. Medicare Assistance is provided to new Medicare beneficiaries who have important time sensitive decisions to make regarding their healthcare.

Throughout the year, but most especially during Medicare Open Enrollment (October 15th through December 7th) volunteer advocates will use the medicare.gov website to provide information to aid Medicare beneficiaries in choosing the most appropriate and cost effective Medicare Part D or Part C plans. This information allows Medicare beneficiaries to make informed decisions about which plans cover their prescription drug and medical needs and at what costs.

Application assistance with state and federal programs is provided for those with modest incomes and if successful increases the income of Medicare beneficiaries by \$134 per month (9-15%) and at a minimum reduces the cost of their drug plan

premium by \$360 annually, caps medication co-pays at \$6.60 and does away with the "donut hole". On-line applications for federal Extra Help will be submitted on the Social Security website and state Medicare Savings Program applications will be submitted through Access Arkansas

Crawford-Sebastian Community Development Council, Inc. has experienced a decrease in the number of Down Payment Assistance applications since the Arkansas Development Finance Authority (ADFA) increased the amount of grant funds available through their Arkansas Dream Down Payment Initiative (ADDI).

According to ADFA's website, "Through ADDI, qualifying low-income Arkansans can be provided up to 10% of the purchase price of their home, not to exceed \$10,000."

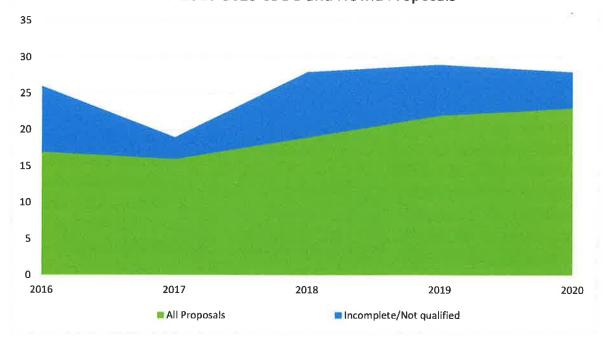

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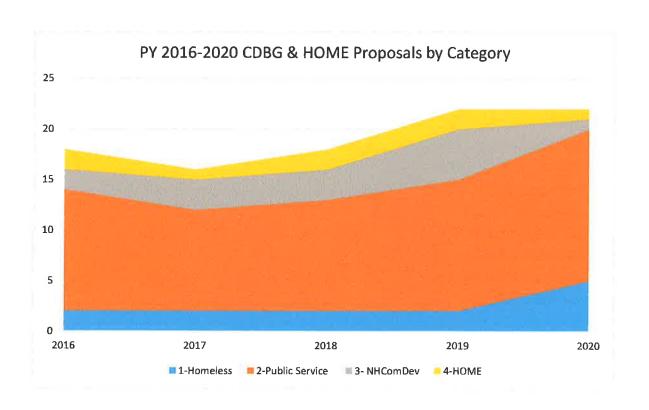

### Jurisdiction Goals, Programs and Policies for reducing the number of Poverty-Level Families

Several of the City's Consolidated Plan goals and objectives address issues related to poverty and assisting those who fall below the poverty level. Examples include:

- Address non-housing community development for special needs populations through public service programs;
- Programs targeting youth, providing education enrichment and job preparedness activities,
   andContinue to collaborate with homeless providers to support Continuum of Care services.

# How are the Jurisdiction poverty reducing goals, programs, and policies coordinated with this affordable housing plan

Activities to reduce the number of poverty-level families will center around strengthening existing collaborations and seeking new ways to partner with agencies and organizations that work directly with poverty-level households to provide intervention and assistance services. Such services may include but are not limited to: counseling, substance abuse, mental health treatment, health services, adult education and job re/training, employment assistance, financial management and credit counseling, parenting programs, after-school and day care assistance programs, and interim cash assistance programs with respect to paying for food, shelter and utility bills.

The City will continue to notify such agencies of funding opportunities to enable them to continue providing and/or expanding their services.

Given the City's limited financial resources and that the majority of factor's affecting a family's poverty-level status are typically beyond the control of City policies, the extent to which the proposed strategies will reduce and/or assist in reducing the number of poverty-level families is difficult to gauge. In the coming future, the Community Development Department will work with the community to address deficiencies and attempt to measure the impact of the CDBG and HOME programs in reducing and/or preventing poverty.
